romelia's story



The Nurtury

Romelia Webb is a 25-year-old mother of two children, four-year-old Zora and six-year-old Harmony. Born and raised in the Bromley-Heath projects of Boston, Mass., her devotion to the neighborhood — even after she moved — is neither mysterious nor overlooked as she is one of the most active volunteers at the Nurtury Learning Lab (NLL), also located in Bromley-Heath.

The NLL is a 22,000-square-foot building featuring state-of-the-art facilities for science, technology, engineering and mathematics (STEM) education, physical fitness and creative arts for children ages five to eight. In 2014, Liberty Mutual Foundation awarded its first gift for Operating Support of the NLL.

While volunteering as a Parent Partner — parents of children attending the NLL who help organize family events, field trips and parenting workshops — Romelia also attends Roxbury Community College in pursuit of an associate degree in early childhood education.

The Nurtury is offering **security** and **opportunity** to Romelia, her children and 1,300 other children from the neighborhood and beyond.



Year Up Puget Sound

Brandon Kinney, a 23-year-old Auburn, Wash., resident, felt insecure about his future as high school graduation approached. After a year in art school, he was saddled with hefty school debt and no clear future.

When a Facebook post revealed details about Year Up Puget Sound, a one-year training program that supplies adults ages 18 to 24 with technical and professional skills and corporate internships, Brandon was skeptical. "I was like, 'So you just work hard and don't have to pay for classes, and they help you get a job and a future?'"

Successfully helping young adults build futures is why the Safeco Insurance Fund awarded Year Up Puget Sound a \$100,000 Operating Support grant, an act that aligns with Liberty's long-standing presence as a founding bicoastal partner and host for Year Up Boston's interns. "When I found out I was going to Microsoft for my internship, I cried," Brandon recalled. "I was finally completing something."

After Brandon's internship ended, he was offered a permanent position, which he happily accepted. Year Up Puget Sound gave Brandon and thousands of others the **opportunity** they needed to gain access to a middle-class career.






Bay Cove

St. Lucia native **Margarite Daniel** was an independent woman before a sudden loss of focus in her eyes and alarming sensation in her head quickly led to a fender bender. Worsening symptoms — including the loss of mobility in her right side — confirmed that Margarite had sustained a stroke and, with it, the loss of her independence.

Luckily, Margarite found the Kit Clark Senior Services, a branch of Bay Cove Human Services, and its exercise and nutrition initiative, Fit for Life.

The staff at Kit Clark Senior Services considers Margarite a part of the Bay Cove family. Along with improved mobility, Bay Cove has provided fresh opportunities for Margarite to reclaim her independence.

Bay Cove offers **accessibility** and **security** to Margarite and thousands of others.

More Investments

Low-Income Housing Tax Credits (LIHTC): As part of our commitment to community development and homelessness relief efforts, Liberty Mutual Investments has committed approximately \$525 million in equity to low-income housing tax credits over the past four years. These investments have contributed to the development of 34,532 affordable housing units in all 50 states and the District of Columbia.

Property Casualty Initiative Fund, LLC (PCI): Liberty Mutual is the majority participant in the Massachusetts PCI Fund, a statewide community loan fund that has created or preserved 3,470 units of affordable housing, funded 102 small businesses and 12 economic development projects, and created or retained 2,100 jobs.

IMPACT Community Capital, LLC: Liberty Mutual is a member of Impact Community Capital, LLC, which makes socially responsible investments in California’s low-income communities. These commitments support multifamily affordable housing and economic development.
